

MG 619 - Phillips Family fonds

Dates: 1925-2019 (inclusive); 1952-1994 (predominant).

Extant: 80.26 cm of textual records, 309 b&w photographs, 110 colour photographs, ephemera, published material, and oversize.

Scope and content: This fonds relates to the lives of siblings or descendants of RHD Phillips and Tanyss (Bell) Phillips. Robert Howard Daniel ("Bob") Phillips (1921-2006) was a journalist. He joined the staff of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool as a research analyst, and later became the editor and publisher of the Western Producer. He married Tanyss Bell in 1951. Tanyss (1926-2016) was an economist who worked in the research department of the Bank of Canada, with the Saskatchewan Royal Commission on Agriculture and Rural Life, as a lecturer at the University of Regina, and as a contract editor. Both were alumni of the University of Saskatchewan.

Arrangement:

This fonds has been organized into two series:

- 1. FE ("Betty") Ball nee Bell (1924-2019) Tanyss (Bell) Phillips' sister and only sibling.
- 2. RAB ("Sandy") Phillips (1955-2013) RHD and Tanyss Phillips' oldest son.

This guide combines accessions 2017-166 and 2020-006.

<u>Series 1: FE ("Betty") Ball</u>. – 1925-2019 (inclusive); 1952-1994 (predominant). – 60.26 cm of textual records, 309 b&w photographs, 110 colour photographs, ephemera, published material, and oversize.

Florence Elizabeth ("Betty") Bell was born on 17 September 1924 in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and grew up on the family farm near Chelan, Saskatchewan. Betty completed her high school education at Nutana Collegiate, Saskatoon (1942), and went on to study home economics at the University of Saskatchewan. Following her graduation in 1946, she interned at Vancouver General Hospital, then accepted a position in Ontario prior to moving to England, where she worked at the Sheffield Royal Infirmary. Betty returned to Canada in 1951, and joined the RCAF in 1952 and retired with the rank of Major in 1973. She served with CUSO in Ghana before returning to Victoria, BC, where she worked with the BC provincial health ministry. She married Robert Ball on 27 March 1976; and "nominally retired" in 1987. She died in 2019.

This series documents the education and military career of Betty Bell, and her work as a dietitian. It is particularly valuable in providing images and information relating to the role of food services in the armed services: specifically, through "behind the scenes" images, memoranda and other documentation that help provide evidence of this little-known aspect of military work. Additionally, the changing role of women between the immediate post-war period through the following six decades is well documented. In particular, it provides an interesting example of the life of an independent, active and community-minded woman throughout her life and career.

Includes material relating to outside training; policies on training; notes on activities; minutes; correspondence from Tanzania regarding placement opportunity; aidesmemoire regarding various excercises and studies; notes on food service management courses; briefing notes; newsletter; etc.

Betty Bell joined the RCAF in November 1952, and was posted at: Clinton (SFS); Metz, France; Winnipeg (TCHQ); Borden (CFSAW); Ottawa (CF HQ) before retiring in June 1973.

Predominantly professional photographs, together with some personal snapshots of colleagues, staff and friends.

Images include trips to Spain; Switzerland; Luxembourg; Netherlands; etc., The photographs are primarily informal snapshots of colleagues and friends, both at work and on holiday.

<u>Scrapbook 3 – 1950-2009</u>. – 90 b&w, 107 colour photographs; postcards; clippings; correspondence; ephemera.

Includes an outline of RCAF Messing Branch, WWII; newsletters; obituaries;

materials relating to reunions; Handbook of Ration Scales for Army and RCAF; School of Food Services Student Information; etc.

In addition to various RCAF stations, images include trips to Mexico; Scotland; France; Bermuda; etc,

Honours and Awards – Heart of Gold Award. – 1988.

Correspondence, clippings. The award was co-sponsored by Air Canada and the Gulf Islands Driftwood newspaper (through the Canadian Community Newspapers Association). It recognized the contributions made "in helping others and improving the quality of life in their community." Nominations were sought over the course of a month; out of over 5,600 nominees, 30 received the award. Includes lyrics to "The Good Old Board Bids Betty Bell Ball Goodbye."

Biographical Note - Robert A. B. Phillips.

Robert AB ("Sandy") Phillips was born in 1955 to RHD and Tanyss Phillips. An entrepreneur, Robert operated Canadian Wilderness Adventure on Lac La Ronge, initially as an outfitter and tour company and then as a houseboat operation, for which he won the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce ABEX Award for the best entrepreneurial venture in 1985. Part of his venture was an attempt to build a four-season destination resort on McGibbon Bay, which would have been the first in the north. Other plans for developments near Craven were left uncompleted when Robert died suddenly in 2013.

Scope and Content: Studies done by the Canadian Wilderness Adventure group relating to a planned resort at Lac La Ronge, Craven – Last Mountain Lake and Land for Nature, British Columbia. Files include the technical reports, prospectuses and EIAs. With a failure to raise the necessary capital, CWA became insolvent and the venture was not built. The only visible legacy is a rudimentary road and a large wooden deck that cascades to the water for a floating dock to attach to it. Eagle Point Resort is located at the beginning of what was the road to the planned resort. Files also include papers and pictures of a block of land the Regina entrepreneur Dave Ash assembled overlooking the Craven marshes and eventually sold mostly to the Nature Conservancy. Robert acquired 21 acres of that block and had plans to develop it that were highly developed but not executed on his death.
